Keynote speakers

Dr. Albert K. BOEKHORST (Visiting Professor, Dept. Information Science University of Pretoria, South-Afrika) - (M)IL And Its Kind

I'm an information scientist, retired from the University of Amsterdam in the Netherlands and still a visiting professor at the University of Pretoria, South Africa. My research concentrates on the access to information, especially on information literacy and the role of (school) libraries.

Among others I'm the Information Officer of the IFLA Information Literacy section, member of IFLA School Libraries and Resource Centers section, member of the board of ENSIL and member of IASL and the Dutch Library Association. I participated in several UNESCO Expert Group Meetings on Media and Information Literacy and coordinated and participated in the worldwide UNESCO TtT in Information Literacy workshops series.

Dr. Rafael BALL (University Library of Regensburg, Germany) - "Are we ready for change? The consequences of the digital revolution for libraries and their users" At the beginning of the 21st Century, we stand at the threshold of the replacement of the printed book as the main medium of our culture and society. Against this background, there will change not only media, machines and processes, and of course the people who work in this information industry.

For libraries, this means massive consequences. Media changes require new concepts in collection management, cataloging, and provision of information and media of the library.

Also customers and their living environment have changed dramatically. Generation Y is accustomed to organizing their lives using mobile devices and relying on an ubiquitous network availability. This is exactly what the customer expects from modern library services.

Systems and processes, but also the underlying theoretical categories of library work have to fit to the changes and challenges in the media and tech world of the 21st Century needs.

This paper discusses these changes and indicates the implications. It examines the question of whether we have the right concepts for libraries.

Ultimately this paper gives a vision of what the library of the future will be.

Dr. Ralf BRUGBAUER (Bayreuth University, Germany), Dr. Rodica VOLOVICI (Lucian Blaga University of Sibiu, Central Library, Romania) - A Successful Collaboration - the Project for the New Building of the University Library in Sibiu

It's a great pleasure to be a guest in the beautiful city of Sibiu once again and it is a great honour that our university, the University of Bayreuth, situated in the North of Bayaria, is involved in the organisation of this event. This in not only a demonstration of the close ties of friendship between our institutions. It is also a symbol for the partnership between them. A Memorandum of Understanding which includes a Twinning Declaration between both university libraries has already been signed by Bayreuth and is on its way to Sibiu. I am very much looking forward to the future cooperation between our two universities.

My connection with University of Sibiu was established in October 2006 when the former President of the University of Marburg, Prof. Dr. W. Schaal, who was President of University LB until 2012, asked me to support him in his efforts to build a new university library in Sibiu.

My part in the project of building a new university library was to provide information about how organisatorial as well as architectural questions concerning library buildings were discussed in Germany.

In the course of our conversations with the university management it became obvious that they also wanted a paradigm shift:

The great number of small department libraries which were scattered all over campus should be united under the roof of one library building with centrally organised processes, such as acquisition, cataloguing and uniform modalities for the library users.

Moreover, questions of how to present the holdings of the library needed to be discussed as well as the formation and composition of new teams amongst the members of staff, who would be working together under the new roof.

As you can see, the demands on the project "A New Libary for the LBUS" were rather high. Moreover, it had to be discussed how library buildings have to be constructed in order to meet future requirements, for example:

- Libraries as locations for learning,
- the "digital revolution" and its implications for the library, such as the "hybrid library",
- or just being able to ensure the longterm availability of conventional media.

As you can see, taking all these aspects into consideration, makes for a rather complex challenge. Therefore, we decided to take a look at different library building projects in Romania and Germany and to discuss the individual approaches with those responsible for the project.

Section I: INFORMATION LITERACY, EDUCATION

Early teaching of information literacy through computers: a challenge for fourth-grade students and the school librarian

Denis VINCEK

Osnovna škola Ante Kovačića (Elementary school), Zlatar, Croatia

The survey conducted among the fourth-graders of Ante Kovačić elementary in Zlatar, Croatia shows that 67 percent of students use Google from their homes at least once a day. 83 percent of students always find the sought answer and up to 88 percent need less than two minutes to do that. According to the National Curriculum, the Croatian elementary school students can choose Computer science as an optional subject from 5th grade on, and the students learn about computers in the 4th grade through Croatian language classes. By that time the students should have adopted "computer" and "Internet" and recognized the computers' possibilities. This often does not go beyond talking about why students use computers at home or in the school library. More creative teachers use the Zondle online platform for learning through computer games, thus introducing students to information and entertainment aspects of computers. In the school year 2011/2012, the Zlatar elementary school librarian took things to the next level - he holds a class with 4th grade teachers on the topic of "Searching the Internet". The goal is for students to acquire the following competencies: defining internet browsers and search engines, differentiating between them, and recognizing and listing the most popular browsers. Apart from showing the habits of fourth-graders in using Google, this work will show how to motivate students to use the school library computers to acquire basic Google searching skills by "playing detectives" and answering the given auestions.

Library leaders in Sweden and Finland: some cultural reflections

Information at Linguistic Library Grzymska HALINA

Librarian, University of Warsaw, Department of Hungarian Studies

The Department of Hungarian Studies of University of Warsaw

- Has been involved in research and teaching since 1952.
- It is a center of hungarian and fenno-ugric research in the fields of literature, linguistics, history and cultural studies.

The department offers two study programs, hungarian (since 1952) and finnish (started in the fall of 2007). Now about 200 students are studying.

The library has a rich collection, including resource library of pre-war Hungarian Institute, the nineteenth - century collections of Debrecen, and even old prints. In total, about 40 000 volumes of books, 160 journals, 342 master's theses, many CD-ROMs. and videotapes. Most of our collections are published in foreign languages: Hungarian, Finnish, Estonian, Russian, German, English and French. But we also have an extensive collection of books in Polish.

The library collects books and journals in many fields, among others:

linguistics, literature, history, history of culture, ethnography, geography, bibliography, relations between Poland and Hungary, Finland and Estonia.

Reading room: Now we have only 8 places to study. In our new building (from November 2012) we will have 21 places for readers. There are also computers with Internet access and printers. We have 272 registered users.

We lend books for students and staff of our department, and of other departments of our university and also for libraries in other cities.

Current Trends in Romanian LIS Higher Education

Octavia-Luciana MADGE

Conf.univ.dr., University of Bucharest, Faculty of Letters, Department of Information and Documentation Sciences

The library and information world has changed significantly during the past decades and along with it a series of changes have taken place at the level of LIS (Library and Information Science) education, Reestablished in its present form after 1990, LIS higher education in Romania has also experienced a period of transformations which aimed to adapt the training of future librarians and information specialists to the current professional standards and worldwide trends in the field but at the same time to the Romanian society needs. Despite a series of difficulties it has had a constant development and without any doubts a contribution to the advancement of the Romanian info-documentary movement. This paper presents the programmes offered at present by the only specialized school in the LIS field, the Department of Information and Documentation Sciences at the University of Bucharest. In the attempt to identify the directions to which Romanian specialized education makes its way it analyzes the structure. level and content of these programmes and suggests some measures for their improvement. The main purpose of this paper is to examine the potential interactions between information environments and learning environments, in order to permit these two worlds to co-exist. We approach problem space in terms of networked information, search and retrieval information and interfaces between institutional repositories in the library and current learning management systems. Other issues covered will be those related to authentication and authorization or digital rights management.

We try to specify the library information environments because the libraries have accumulated an important experience in working in distributed information environments and they have been investing more in bringing together other materials such as digitized rare and historical materials, and institutional research and learning resources into the distributed information environments.

From our viewpoint library systems and e-learning systems need to interact in many ways from the simply incorporating collections of learning objects into the traditional library. The dynamic interactions means that teachers and learners will find new ways of developing learning activities, which in turn will influence the way they use learning activities and information content. Our analyze of the library service interactions with learning systems environments will take into account the potential transformation of learning activity. Universities must develop a digital campus that includes two important concepts of digital information management and e-learning management.

Another aspect considered in our paper is that referring to information literacy related with university libraries which should provide remote access to its collections but also to information networks: training on information resources, retrieval strategies and how to use the information retrieved. We must recognize that library services have to change according to the new developments and they must to achieve a lot of conditions to become an

integrative library. Integrating the library into the e learning process implies changes regarding new services and delivery systems.

Need of content improvement and information update in academic library website design

The information society is continuously changing and this transformation has to be also reflected both in the collections and in the services of the academic library. Hence, the necessity for their permanent review is required, as a consequence of adaptation and adjustment to the demands and expectations of the customers. The object of this study is Neuer Siebenburgischer Privinzial-Kalender, a calendar in German language, published in Sibiu (Hermannstadt), and printed from the late 18th century and almost throughout the 19th century. We are taling about a collection which belings to the Brukenthal national Museum Library, and 18th century baronial legacy dating back to the Transylvanian Enlightenment times. This collection is not only important for itself, as a group of periodicals with their own peculiarity, but it is also significant for the information about everyday life and different kind of networks. In this respect, one can say that Neuer Siebenburgischer Provinzial-Kalender is a kind of timetable for rural population, especially with very practical implication of daily life. For example, besides data about Sundays and holy days, the calendars also provides astronomical information. One has to have in mind that at the beginning of the 19th century, Sibiu was a vibrant city, tuned to the realities of its time, the third city in the Habsburg (later Austro-Hungarian) Empire.

After the revolution of 1989 in Romania appeared over 1200 new publications. Some of them do not appear today any longer, but others, still do. The Romanian newspaper market is counting now about 1500 publications: most of all are weekly papers, 200 of them are daily papers, 14 of them come out in Bucharest and one to five in the biggest cities of the Romanian counties. Despite that, even if the Romanian press is very diverse, it is not yet a completely free press - see also the report of 2009 of the organization "Freedom House". Regarding the independence of the press, 66% of the people interviewed in Romania believe that generally the media is independent, 41% however have the opinion that the media independence can be limited and only 22% believe that this independence does not exist. All these problems require some good answers from the communication sciences. An option is the idea of a new concept in the mass communication - cross media - and a good education and practice of the young journalists, the goal of the TEMPUS project of the University of Sibiu, together with the University of Passau Germany and other 23 partners from Europe, with Cross Media and Quality Journalism (Crossmedia Qualitätsjournalismus - CuQ). This paper explains the main problems in the mass communication in Romania today.

Feature Selection in Document Classification

Text classification, as part of text mining domain, is the problem of classifying text documents into a set of predefined classes. After extracting the features, documents are represented as a vector containing a huge number of features. When working on large collections of documents both time and memory restrictions are prohibitive and, therefore, we have to apply feature selection methods to reduce the dimensionality of the vector. In this paper, we evaluate

three feature selection methods: one based on the 1R classifier, Information Gain and Gain Ratio. The best results were obtained with the Information Gain method and for a relatively small dimension of the feature vector. The best accuracy of 93.58% was obtained using only 27.14% of features.

Relation of Information Literacy Education with active learning among of the Students master Degree of Razi University

The quickly changing information and technology landscape requires increasingly sophisticated. Information literacy skills for the navigation, evaluation, and use of information. The purpose of this paper is to present a broader analytical insight to the information literacy concept, in order to achieve an information literate society. This is an applied survey method. A questionnaire including 32 questions and three parts was used. The significance level was considered $P \leq 0.05$. In order to test the research hypotheses, Chi-square test and T- test were

used. Education and university systems and institutions must take seriously the challenges of the Information Age. This includes restructuring the learning process to reflect the use of information in the real world, changing the role of the teacher from presenter of prefabricated facts to facilitator of active learning, and including the library/media specialist as a collaborator in curriculum planning for effective use of information resources. Active learning is not represented in the teacher -centered classroom where the teacher is an active transmitter of information and the students are passive recipients. Active Learning is, in short, anything that students do in a classroom other than merely passively listening to an instructor's lecture. Teachers require a comprehensive understanding of information literacy to guide their own knowledge creation activities that will ultimately affect their future students and active learning of them.

Building Successful Information Literacy Infrastructure in Promoting Student Engagement in Learning: The Role of the University Academic Library

Gianina O. CABANILLA

Qualitative analysis was used to prepare a full picture of the teaching strategies and library research experiences of 118 English 10 students, 10 English 10 teachers, and 3 UP main library reference librarians over a six-month period for the 2nd Semester, AY 2010-2011 in the University of the Philippines, Diliman. The participants were interviewed concerning their demographic conditions such as students' year level, gender, and academic major, teachers' and reference librarians' educational attainment, years of English 10 teaching experience, years of teaching library research in the university, rank designation, normal educational attainment, and the areas in which they described their teaching strategies and library research experiences. The researcher took the role of observer/interviewer for the sessions. Interviews and talk during English 10 sessions with the teachers, students, and reference librarians were transcribed, coded and contextualized, adding to the understanding of the design of a library research instruction module for English 10. Using a Grounded theory methodology created by Strauss and Corbin (1998), transcripts of the interviews were divided by linguistic idea units and coded according to categories and subcategories, processes, influencing conditions, strategies, and outcomes related to library research instruction, which contributed to the articulation of the theories and the modules. The grounded theories exist in three areas: (1) English 10 teachers group; (2) UP main library reference librarian group; and (3) English 10 students group. Additionally, a coding scheme was created out of the ACRL Information Literacy Competency Standards for Higher Education precepts and from the responses of this study that focused on the performance indicators which helped objectify the nature of the module's model of instruction. Findings revealed that although reference librarians were providing library instruction sessions that some English 10 faculty members and English 10 students found to be beneficial, walk-ins and one-to-one assistance, activities that incorporated both technical and pedagogical strategies were still necessary. This study provides information that can be used to assist academic librarians when preparing to teach library research instruction and to assist academic libraries in redesigning and developing library research instruction activities for preparing librarians to teach undergraduates. The Library Research Instruction Program for English 10 (LRIE) that serves as the core of the work provide an instructional module that can be used by librarians for diversifying their instructional delivery with engaging learning tasks.
