Recent Developments in the Information Behaviour of Library Users in Romania

In the information society the evolution of services provided by academic libraries has kept up with the new features of the higher education system, and followed the changes and needs recorded at its level and in the process of teaching, learning and assessment, but also the adjustment to the new practices of users in the process of information search and retrieval. Diversification of the information services and of the format in which they are supplied by libraries is closely connected to the new technologies and applications that enable fast communication. In Romania, the information needs and user behaviour have been analysed in recent years in a series of researches which investigated issues related primarily to the impact of new technologies and the access to electronic information resources, the results indicating similar practices to those from other countries but also completely different aspects in terms of the information behaviour. This paper presents aspects regarding the information behaviour of library users from Romania and the changes it has known in recent years, starting from the results of a research conducted at the level of several libraries from different university centres in Romania.

Specific aspects of user satisfaction in the university library

Criteria of service provision: INTANGIBILITY, INSEPARABILITY, UN-STOCKABILITY, VARIABILITY, USER-LIBRARIAN INTERACTION.

Services. Their role and importance

- intangibility: services through their very nature are intangible
- inseparability: the overlapping of services production and consumption in time
- un-stockability: services cannot be stored for later use
- variability: the service cannot be repeated identically

Users' expectations in a university library:

- Responsiveness: promptness of response to user requests (including response to complaints);
- Courtesy: library staff attitudes towards the user;
- Understanding: the extent to which the librarian understands user requirements;
- Degree of understanding: the ability to provide the same quality service every time;
- Communication: quality of information provided to the user;
- Competence: knowledge resulting from service;
- Tangible service features: the state of the natural resources used in providing the service (buildings, equipment, etc.);
- Credibility: confidence in the services offered by the library
- User's physical safety or the security of storing user related information;
- Access: user's ease in personally or electronically addressing library contacts

Conclusions:

The analysis of users' satisfaction is the basis for finding procedures of continuously improving service quality. One approach needed to ensure continuous improvement of user satisfaction is the use of the "Conceptual Model of Service Quality".

The degree of user satisfaction can be measured by different methods. Example: SERVQUAL questionnaires.

The Quality management system should take into account the issue of human resources commitment in:

- creating an appropriate environment;
- considering human relations as an essential part of service quality (user-person in direct contact with the user);
- recognizing the importance to be given to the user's perception of the image, culture and achievements of the library;
- developing the qualification and capability of library employees;
- motivating employees.

The WEKA MultilayerPerceptron Classifier

Document classification is a must when dealing with large collection of documents. WEKA, and especiallyWeka Knowledge Flow Environment, is a state-of-the-art tool for developing classification applications, even with no programming abilities. We continue our WEKA project presented in a previous paper but change the classification step, now using the MultilayerPerceptron Classifier. The used dataset is one based on documents from the Reuters Corpusand vector space model representation, the number of features being reduced by using the Information Gainmethod. The theoretical bases for MultilayerPerceptron neural networks are presented, both for the architecture and for the backpropagation learning algorithm. In order to evaluate the performance of the MultilayerPerceptron Classifier experiments were done, first with the default network architecture. Results are presented and prove valuable, but for a large number of features the performances decrease. In order to improve the obtained results we test different fine-tuned architectures by changing the number of neurons in the hidden layer. Therefore, the Weka MultilayerPerceptron Classifier is a classifier that deservesattention, but mainly when time requirements are not important at all.

Part of Speech Tagging in Romanian Texts

Identifying parts of speech (PoS) represents the process by which grammar tags containing their corresponding PoS are attached automatic to every word within a sentence. Since no word acts as just one single PoS—their syntactic value depending on the context they are used in—identifying parts of speech is not a trivial matter. For the purpose of this paper we have taken into account two tagging methods, based on Naïve Bayes' classifierprobabilities and the occurring context of the word for which the PoS must be identified. We have called these methods Backward Naïve Bayes and Forward Naïve Bayes. For Romanian we have taken into account seven different PoS: noun, verb, adjective, adverb, article, preposition plus the "and others" category. From conducted experiments we have observed that identifying the PoS for a word based on the PoS for the previous word produces better results in all respects. We have studied each PoS separately and have concluded that there also are more easily identifiable PoS in Romanian as well: article, preposition, noun, verb; meanwhile the adjective and adverb are more problematic in identifying the PoS.

Approaches for automate pattern recognition in digital libraries

Items from digital libraries are usually marked using binary patterns or other kind of markers that can be reduced to binary patterns. The goal is to allow performing different tasks like author identification, classification using various criteria, identification of content modifications. Alteration of binary patters used as markers can occur due to information transmission or different transformations applied to the digital content. The purpose of this article is to present and analyze two approaches for automate recognition of altered binary patterns. Practical results are reported for the case of invisible watermarks.

Rudolph Heinrich Zobel, Über die Erziehung der Frauenzimmer (About the Education of Girls), Berlin, G. A. Lange, 1773 and Friedrich Philipp Wilmsen, Der deutsche Kinderfreund (German Children's Friend, Berlin (first edition 1801)

The 18th century put reason and knowledge in the foreground. One of the premises of achieving these goals was child rearing and education. The first influential book in the field was J. J. Rousseau's (1712-1778) Emile (1762), whose theory of child centered education was taken over or referred to critically by a lot of authors, among whom the German Rudolf Wilhelm Zobel. The sole copy of this book preserved in the Brukenthal Library in Sibiu belonged to the personal library of Baron Samuel von Brukenthal (1721-1803), who was highly interested in education. The book can be also read online, being digitized by the State and University Library of Dresden.

Unlike Rousseau, whose Emile referred to the education of children of both sexes, Zobel's book has only the education of female subjects in mind. He writes 34 letters to a lady, mother of 4 children, 3 girls and a boy, and in each of it discusses a particular aspect of education. Most of his ideas are very modern being applicable also nowadays. They do not address only to the upper class, but can be followed also in bourgeois families or even in those of craftsmen. His main thesis is child centered education. Zobel starts from the premise that girls have to be educated differently from boys because: a/ they are both - from the physical and psychological point of view - more delicate, characteristics educators have to bear in mind and b/they have to be prepared to play different social roles. While sons must embrace a career, daughters must be trained for the role of wives, mothers and especially for that of manager of the house (not necessary housewife). For Zobel the duties of house manager seemed very important and, consequently, he recommended that no matter of social class, girls must acquire manual skills like cooking, washing, ironing etc. The conclusion of the book is the following: the sexes are complementary, women's role in the couple is very important, as a well educated wife can contribute to the wealth and prestige of her family and, at the contrary, can destroy its reputation.

Friedrich Philipp Wilmsen's (1770-1831), Der deutsche Kinderfreund (German Children's Friend) was a bestseller during the 19th century which knew hundreds of editions and reprints. The first copy I have seen belonged to the personal library of the metropolitan Andrei Şaguna (1808-1873) The cover page and the first 12 pages of the book were lacking, so I had to do a lot of research to identify the author and the title of the work. Thanks to the internet I found out all these data. Wilmsen, an important pedagogue, realized that the schoolbooks of his time were boring, and, consequently, he decided to

write something interesting. He really succeeded, as the Kinderfreund knew more than 200 editions and reprints and was also used in German schools from abroad. The book was even translated in the Romanian principalities. Until now I have identified 2 German copies in the Brukenthal library, both being published in Sibiu (one of them in 1828) and comprising also a chapter about Transylvania, one copy in the Pedagogical Library in Bucharest (also published in Sibiu in 1828) and a German copy in the University Library in Jassy (published in Berlin, in 1848). The Brukenthal Library also holds a copy in Romanian, written in Cyrillic (published in Bucharest in 1848), while the University Library Cluj holds two Romanian copies, the one printed in Bucharest, in 1850, and the other in Jassy, in 1856. both written in transitional alphabet. All the Romanian copies are bearing the title Prietenul tinerimii, o carte de cetire pentru şcoalele populare. Both books I dealt with are very interesting, being worth even nowadays to be read.

Integrating controlled vocabulary in the institutional Digital Repository. Study case: Digital Collections of the LBUS Library

Through institutional digital repositories, universities offer open access to the scientific publications, courses or old and rare documentary resources. These printed documents have been digitized, described, indexed and cataloged in dedicated systems.

To facilitate the search and especially to make it efficient and accurate, digital resources must be described and classified as fully and rigorously chosen keywords, accurately. The archived information is indexed by keywords.

The information contained in the digital archives become relevant and are thus discovered by careful indexing by well-chosen keywords.

The objective of the Europeana thematic campaigns:

- is to focus on the communications that support Europeana,
- highlight the nature of content and availability for reuse, and
- work towards improved quality of data.

2017 Campaigns:

- Words and text are in the spotlight
- focus on online campaign on social media,
- collecting high quality text from libraries and archives and focusing on different types of existing content.

This has lead to a creation of the **#AllezLiterature** campaign under the **#AlllezCulture** umbrella.

#AllezLiterature - 4 phases:

- 1) genres letters and diaries from the WWI,
- 2) poetry,
- 3) books, and
- 4) is not defined yet the group has been contacting libraries and archives and asking them to propose ideas.

External milestones:

- Valentine's Day (launched on 14 th February) this one had a great response with 30 articles published in 10 languages, a doubled number of subscribers, and a hashtag being used widely.
- Love stories from WWI
- International Book Day (will be launched on 23 rd April)

Poetry of all kinds can be used, the institutions can propose ideas under different genres and share them across Europe on social media

Europeana content will be used but we are open to new sources as long as there is no license-related issue, including fresh sources of poetry written by European citizens.

Thematic campaign: all about words:

2018 = Migration: European year of Cultural Heritage

2017 = Words and TextKeywords: digital collection, publishing, opening policy.

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
